

CAMDEN NEWS NOTES

** The Burlington Gold Mining Company, capital \$50,000, filed articles of incorporation in the County Clerk's office yesterday.

** Rev. J. W. Lee, pastor of Raleigh Avenue M. E. Church, will preach to-night on "The Man Who Was Betrayed by a Letter." Prior to the sermon he will deliver an address on "The Recent Action of the Excluse Board."

** While responding to an alarm of fire from Farr & Bailey's Oilcloth Works, on Pine street, yesterday, Engine No. 1 crashed into a repair wagon of the Public Service Corporation. Fortunately no one was hurt, although the driver of the repair wagon was hurled into a snow bank.
