to Greet the Candidate.

TRENTON FOLKS OUT ENMASSE

Republicans Are As Eager As Any to See the Form
and Hear the Voice of He Who Makes the Nation
Pause to Harken to His Silvery Eloquence.

The Details of His Coming, His Staying in
Town and His Departure Hence.



BRYAN'S ITINERARY.

To Arrive 3:05 P. M. Broad Street Station.

To Speak at Opera House 3:20 P. M.

To be Driven North on Broad and East on Perry to Swamp Angel,
Where a Speech Will be Delivered From His Carriage at 4 P. M.

To be Driven Down South Clinton Avenue to Pennsylvania Depot.

The Democrats of New Jersey to-day have Col. William Jennings Bryan, Presidential candidate of the National Democratic party, as their guest, and in order to do him honor have gathered in Trenton's famous Opera House—the scene of many political triumphs—to listen to the teaching of his doctrines from his own lips.

Mr. Bryan is scheduled to arrive here at 3:05 P. M., coming in his special car on the Camden and Amboy Division and alighting at the Broad street depot, within the shadow of Roebblings' enormous mills. He will be escorted through New Jersey by a special delegation from the State Committee and will be greeted at Broad street depot by a committee of prominent local Democrats, consisting of Col. Lewis Ferrine, ex-Judge Robert S. Woodruff, Joseph L. Naar, ex-Senator Jonathan Blackwell, G. D. W. Vroom, John H. Scudder, Gen. Richard A. Donnelly, ex-Mayor Daniel J. Bechtel, William F. Gordon, William J. Convery and ex-Assemblyman James W. Lanning.

Together the State delegation and Trenton committee will escort Mr. Bryan to the Opera House, where he will again be greeted by a second reception committee of Trentonians composed as follows: William F. Gordon, chairman; Harry S. Provost, secretary; William H. Hatfield, John R. Slack, William H. Hatfield, John R. Slack, Alfred Wilson, William McGill, Jr., Jules A. Charles, Jr., E. These combined reception committees will then escort Mr. Bryan to the stage of the Opera House, from which he will address the convention of State League of Clubs for upwards of three quarters of an hour.

Upon his entrance in the hall Ruhlmann's band will play "The Star-Spangled Banner" and the delegates and spectators will wave small American flags.

From the Opera House, at the conclusion of his speech, Mr. Bryan will be driven up North Broad street and through Perry to the Swamp Angel, near the State Schools. He will there make an open-air speech from his carriage. It is expected that he will reach the Swamp Angel at 4 o'clock.

From the Swamp Angel he will be driven to Clinton street depot, where he will board his special car "Rambler" and proceed to Princeton Junction, his next stopping place.

Col. Bryan began his tour through New Jersey this morning at Camden. He stopped at the Hotel Lafayette, in Philadelphia, last night and was received at 9 o'clock this morning at the hotel by the following party of Jersey-men, who will act as his escort while in the State today and tomorrow: Senator Johnston Cornish, who will be pilot-in-chief; State Committeeman H. B. Paul and Judge Howard Carrow, of Camden; W. J. Keyes, of Sussex; John T. French, of Atlantic; James W. Lanning, of Mercer; Judge W. W. Cutler, of Morris. Beside these were William K. Devereux, Secretary of the State Committee; Elector-at-Large Thomas H. Birch and former Judge Glasgow, of Burlington; former Postmaster H. H. Postoll and Charles J. Collins, of Atlantic; former Assemblyman William J. Thompson and County Detective John S. Smith, of Camden.

After a reception the committee escorted him to Washington Park, where a meeting was held and Mr. Bryan made a speech. After the meeting the tour of the State was started and Trenton will be reached somewhere between 3 and 4 o'clock.

After leaving Washington Park Mr.

Bryan proceeded northerly, speaking at Westville, Riverside and Burlington.

After leaving Trenton he will speak at Princeton Junction to students and thence go to New Brunswick. Leaving the latter place at 6:40 P. M., he will proceed to Elizabeth and from thence to Jersey City, where he will address five meetings tonight.

Tomorrow will be passed in the upper counties of the State.
