

ARMISTICE SERVICES IN CAMDEN CHURCHES

Legion Posts and Laymen Join in Conducting Patriotic Exercises

Hebrew Society Holds Me- morial for Members Who Lost Lives in War

Armistice Day services were held in some of the Camden churches yesterday. At the services at Broadway M. E. Church were sung patriotic songs thrown on the screen. The hymns were illustrated by colored stereoptican slides. Rev. W. Earl Ledden preached.

Members of Raymond C. Thoira Post, American Legion, attended the services at the First Presbyterian Church, Fifth and Penn streets. Rev. George H. Hemingway, pastor, preached and a musical programme was given. Special services were held in the Cedar Brook and New Brooklyn churches. In the Cedar Brook Church an address was delivered by Charles M. Curry, a layman, of Broadway M. E. Church, Camden. Special music was given. Rev. Horace S. Miller, pastor, presided.

At Tabernacle M. E. Church, Third and Pearl streets, Camden, Chief Manatowog, of Trenton, a full-blood Indian, 70 years old, occupied the pulpit last night in Indian attire. At the Grace Baptist Church, East Camden, Rev. C. W. Sheriff, pastor, preached on "Some Results of the World War." Members of the American Legion were guests at the services at St. John's P. E. Church last night.

In memory of the five Y. M. H. A. members who lost their lives in the war, memorial services were held in the Y. M. H. A. building, 570 Walnut street, Camden, yesterday afternoon. The exercises opened with prayer by Rabbi Itziff, followed by a piano solo by Miss Brewer; a recitation by Miss Dora Yuschinsky; an address by Rabbi Samuel Fredman, chaplain U. S. A.; a vocal solo by Miss Speckan; address, "Y. M. H. A. Boys in Service," by Lieutenant Lewis Liberman; "Elmole Rachmin," by Rabbi Mickelman, and choir; a eulogy, "Facts of the Unknown," by Samuel Bashlow; an address by Rabbi Harry S. Davidowitz, chaplain 78th Division, and closing prayer by Rabbi Solomon Grayzel.

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After Lewis Lederer, of Oaklyn, was hit by an automobile at Broadway and Keight avenue, Camden, yesterday and taken to Cooper Hospital in the machine that hit him, he wanted to know: "What happened to the machine? I guess it was hurt more than I was," he said, "and refused to make complaint. The driver of the car, Warren Parker, of Gloucester, was not arrested.
